

# The Third Annual Brigham-Kanner Property Rights Conference and Presentation of the 2006 Brigham-Kanner Prize to Professor James W. Ely, Jr. October 6-7, 2006

The Brigham-Kanner Property Rights Conference and Brigham-Kanner Property Rights Prize are named in recognition of Toby Prince Brigham and Gideon Kanner for their lifetime contributions to private property rights, their efforts to advance the constitutional protection of property, and their accomplishments in preserving the important role that private property plays in protecting individual and civil rights.

Mr. Brigham is an attorney who has specialized in eminent domain and property rights law for more than 40 years and is a founding partner of Brigham Moore, LLP, in Florida. Professor Kanner is professor of law emeritus at the Loyola Law School and is currently of counsel at Manatt, Phelps & Phillips, LLP, in California.



Professor James W. Ely, Jr., is the recipient of the 2006 Brigham-Kanner Prize. He is the Milton R. Underwood Chair in Free Enterprise, professor of law, and professor of history at Vanderbilt University. Professor Ely has written on a wide range of topics in legal history and is the author of numerous works including *The Guardian of Every Other Right: A Constitutional History of Property Rights* (2d ed., Oxford University Press, 1998), *American Legal History: Cases and Materials* (3rd ed., Oxford University Press, 2004) (with Kermit L. Hall and Paul Finkelman), *The Fuller Court: Justices, Rulings, and Legacy* (ABC-CLIO, 2003), and *Railroads and American Law* (University Press of Kansas,

2001). He served as assistant editor of the *American Journal of Legal History* from 1987-99 and has received numerous teaching awards since joining the Vanderbilt faculty in 1972. Professor Frank I. Michelman of Harvard Law School was the inaugural recipient of the Brigham-Kanner Prize in 2004. Professor Richard A. Epstein of the University of Chicago Law School

received the 2005 Prize.

In addition to commentary on the impact of Professor Ely's work, the conference will include a discussion of the protections given to property rights compared to those given other rights under the Constitution. The conference concludes with a luncheon round table which will explore judicial responses to *Kelo*.


